Welcome and Regular Business

Co-chair Anderson opened the meeting at 1:02 pm. Participants introduced themselves. The co-chair walked participants through meeting objectives and preparatory materials. Corrections to the September SC meeting summary were shared in track change mode.

OWNF – People, Proposals, Projects

Head Count Cap, Staffing Update

The Regional Forester received the selection for the WRRD position and the District is awaiting approval. Amid the head-count caps, OWNF priority is funding for current salaried positions. Currently 14 restoration related vacancies, plus additional recreation vacancies. The SO will create a new organizational chart at the end of the calendar year that aligns with head count cap, excluding fire staff. The OWNF continues to have a lot of movement with staff detailing into new roles/positions.

The Washington Office requested an estimate of a preliminary post fire recovery needs to prepare for potential appropriations. The OWNF had several large fires on the north end of the district Cub Creek 2,

Fire-Season Update

The SO provided a summary of the fire season, which included Cedar Creek, 25 mile Entiat, South District Snyder Creek on the Naches (107,000 acres at last tally). Over 207,000 acres burned. Next steps on post-fire activity include:

- 1. Suppression repair (hand lines, dozer line repair)
- 2. Burned Area Emergency Response
- 3. Post fire restoration (tree salvage not funded within current appropriations.)

BAER team to come out and assess Cedar Creek, Cub Creek 2, and 25 mile. Rapid Assessment Team (RAT) available in the MVRD, and will head to Snyder Creek once it is out. BAER repairs have 1 year from when fire is wrapped up (quick turnaround). Fire restorations have more time (utilize partners and what the timeline is for)

Agree on Any Next Steps/Follow-up:

UWPP

Consultation, LSR Process/Progress

Consultation timeline: Biological Assessment is on track for mid-Nov (11/18) completion. Once Level 1, consultation begins, anticipate 135 days for Biological Opinion and a final EA (April 2022). May be possible to get a sneak peak of EA 1 week prior to legal notice for objection period. A lot of work in LSR habitat and loss of Monty Cook/ OWNF staff knowledge, makes things challenging. Engagement by NMFS and new USFWS is also a unknown, uncertain given lack of a BA to support consultation.

September Sales Tour Report Out

Participants went to the field and discussed preliminary draft prescriptions, D x P approach vs. individual tree marking. May need to increase volume for economic viability. Need to identify local sources of rock, gravel if possible and mechanisms for NCWFHC to contribute to areas not of commercial value, opportunities to treat more acres, sooner through partnership. There are potential funding pots to assist with implementation, namely Legacy Roads and Trails, Forest Resiliency Bonds, NFF, etc.

Chelan County Updates

Chelan County presented on its work to build on the DNR's completed Vegetation Structure Model/Roads Assessment, update the landscape assessment, and figure out the NEPA process pathway for Aquatic and terrestrial. YN currently reviewing SOW; County will share final draft with Members. Key communications with stakeholders regarding treatment areas and FRB options will be starting this fall.

The County has interest in evaluating and building mill infrastructure and has had several public private meetings to develop funding partnerships totaling \$350,000 (50-50 with Wood Innovations Grant Program) for a forest innovation campus. Next steps include

- ✓ Assemble task force
- ✓ Perform Outreach work
- ✓ Discuss pathways for NCWFHC engagement

Blue Forest/FRB

Blue Forest is assessing key UWPP landscapes (polygons 4,5,6) and exploring how to move treatments in some areas up, sooner on the timeline and define geographic potential for FRB, what implementation plan could look like. Sequencing discussions are underway with WRRD via Michell Caviness and Andy Hart, who will need to loop in new staff coming aboard.

- Mike Kaputa to Reach out to FS staff on sequencing and Tracking of Blue Forest work.
- Anjolene Price/ Economics subgroup to coordinate meeting with Mike Kaputa on Wood Innovations Grant.

Priorities for Engagement with MVRD

Mike L. shared the PWG priority ranking of MVRD projects the collaborative is interested in engaging with the district on (based on Projects Committee meeting September 30, 2021)

- 1. Twisp
- 2. Fire Salvage and reforestation needs
- 3. Shaded fuelbreaks
- 4. Mission Sale
- 5. Buckshot
- 6. Next Landscape Assessment Area

Members agreed informational/ White Papers should be vetted by the PWG before sharing with the SC. A member did not recall the above topics prioritization outcome, which occurred at the end of the 9/30 PWG call. The MVRD needs to focus on time-sensitive priorities like BAER, post-fire restoration for Cedar Creek, Twisp.

Agree on Any Next Steps/Follow-up:

• The PWG-SC will continue engagement with MVRD re: what ecological restoration can look like after fire, discussion of Twisp, other priorities

FRS Refresh

CNW executed a contract for FRS Refresh work with Bill Gaines. OWNF is awaiting arrival of key personnel (Ecologist). This will extend timeline and allow alignment of aquatic, terrestrial content rigor.

Agree on Any Next Steps/Follow Up:

• Mike will follow-up with Bill Gaines and OWNF about revisions, and YN regarding Aquatics SOW alignment

Roundtable

- TWS is adding staff support for NCWFHC activities. Position open till the end of October.
